- A child-centered philosophy




QCSM supports quality early learning and care programs that have environments, relationships, interactions, and activities to support all children's growth and development to prepare them for success in school and life.







NUMBER OF CHILDREN SERVED BY PROGRAM TYPE




AGE-GROUP OF CHILDREN SERVED BY PROGRAM TYPE



■ Infants & Toddlers ■ Preschoolers


NUMBER OF EDUCATORS BY PROGRAM TYPE








Demographics of Children Served



Equity: a goal-where everyone can reach their full potential.


Inclusion: a practice -to make space for people and ensure people are included

Who has more power and privilege?






NFO/RWC Structural and Institutional Racism

Youth of Color who reported that they had been discriminated against Always, Most of the Time, or Sometimes in the past year...



Inequalities Exist Across the State

The magnitude of need in CA is enormous. In every community there are those who are born facing greater challenges



47% of CA's children live in or near poverty

About **754,000** young children (25% of all children age 0-5) live in poverty.



Life expectancy varies dramatically from one neighborhood to the next:

- In the Bay Area, life expectancies across ZIP codes vary by as much as **13 years**
 - The life expectancy in West Oakland is **67**, similar to countries such as Turkmenistan, Kazakhstan, and North Korea
- In West Fresno, life expectancy is >20
 years lower than in other parts of the city
- In Los Angeles, there's a **12-year gap** in life expectancy across neighborhoods

Current Equity Focus and Strategic Plan Focus

- Socio-economically disadvantaged
- Students with special needs
- English language learners
- Reside-services in high-priority zip codes
- Infants and toddlers
- Endorsing practices with evidence of effectiveness
- Focusing on prevention and early identification
- Targeting populations most at risk
- Balancing direct services with efforts that contribute to broader systems change
- Considering the contextual landscape at the local, state, and federal level by examining the policy and budget landscape, partnership opportunities, and other funding and sustainability considerations

New Equity Performance Measures

Zip Codes

Tracking the number of clients within different zip codes who receive F5SMC-funded services will allow us to examine whether targeted services are reaching those likely to be most in need.



New Equity Performance Measures

Equity-related Characteristics of Funded Organizations

Number/proportions of board members, executive leadership, managers/supervisors, and line staff who are women, people of color, LGBTQ, bilingual and bicultural



ACTION PLAN

- Intentionally targeted investments and systems improvement efforts towards populations of children and families that may experience challenges related to inequitable access to resources, systemic oppression, or situations within their families that can compromise child development
- Track the number of clients across race/ethnicity who receive
 F5SMC-funded services. (Disaggregated)



ACTION PLAN

- Track the zip code of clients served who are funded by F5SMC (Disaggregated)
- Learn about the equity-related characteristics of funded organizations (Disaggregated)
- Implement Racial Equity, Human Centered Design (101) and Trauma & Resiliency Coaching and Consultation for F5 Staff and Commissioners to support F5's work internally and externally.





We will look into..

- Analysis of grantee individual-level client data, service data, and project activities
- Analysis and dashboard of clients receiving intensive services
- Comprehensive analysis of service and systems level activities relative to F5SMC's desired outcomes, collaboration between agencies, policy and advocacy
- Surveys i.e. Friday CAFÉ, Grantee COVID Pandemic Survey, etc.
- Population-level indicators

- Recommendations from Family Story Project – Conversations with Families Raising Young Children in SMC During COVID-19
- The Early Identification and intervention System in SMC Environmental Scan
- Local, Regional & Statewide data, surveys, population indicators (i.e., Workforce, Early Mental Health)
