

How confident are you that future generations, like your children or grandchildren, will be able to afford to live in your community?





"I am likely to move out of the Bay Area in the next few years."








# Investing in family resources centers, supporting mental health programs, and providing dedicated resource for childcare facilities are the most strongly supported investments.

# Building blocks of early learning and care

### **WELL-BEING**

- Prenatal and postnatal:
   ensuring expectant mothers
   have access to health care and
   that mothers, babies, and
   families have support after
   birth, including nurse-home
   visiting
- Birth equity: supporting better outcomes for women of color, who often receive suboptimal care
- Health, vision, dental and more: ensuring that children have the physical and mental health supports they need to thrive
- Other health determinants: mitigating food and housing insecurity, chronic stress, and other environmental factors that impact child development

### CARE

- Access: ensuring that child care (including infant care) is affordable and available
- Quality: supporting safe, inclusive, and developmentally appropriate care settings
- Facilities: incentivizing and streamlining development and renovation of early learning facilities
- Workforce: providing supports to ensure a diverse, well-trained, and fairly compensated workforce



### **LEARNING**

- Parental support: giving parents tools to be their child's first teacher from birth on
- School readiness: supporting families, providers, and practitioners to ensure young learners have equitable access to high-quality early education
- Educational resources:
   Developing curriculum, toys, or other tools to support emerging academic skills and to foster creativity and curiosity; supporting early intervention services





One family that I had the honor of working with this past year had been in our program since he was an infant. His mom was 15 years old when Isaac was born, he started at our Redwood City Teen parent program, when the program closed, he transferred to Haven CDC at 18 months of age.

At the time of admittance both parents were teenagers living in their parents' garage. Throughout the three years, they were able to find great careers, one becoming a CNA and the other a chef. They eventually were able to move out of their parent's garage and move to their own apartment in Santa Clara. Despite this change in address, the family wanted to continue his education at Haven CDC, and he was able to graduate from our program in June of 2022.

Unfortunately, during the last half of the year, the father endured a tragic car accident that left him injured. With the help from our site supervisor and the staff at Haven the student was able to finish out his year strong, and the father recovered from the accident. Before leaving our program, I worked with the family to get this student enrolled in a private school near us. I helped them fill out enrollment applications, scholarship applications, and even practiced before the parent interview. The student got into the private school and is doing quite well!

We are fortunate enough to still be in close contact with this family and their son is doing well at his new school.






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Understanding emotions is a critical part of child development. It is our responsibility as adults to teach children to understand, label and manage their emotions appropriately.

Quiet corners help children:

- Understand their feelings, emotions and develop the ability to manage them effectively in challenging and changing situations.
- Accept their emotions without repressing them;
   and
- How to recover and learn self-regulation.

Managing all these emotions is essential & offering an intimate space helps work it out.







These are some of the situations in which children visit the Quiet Corner:

- 1. When they feel angry and need to calm down
- 2. When they want to relax and see how they feel inside
- 3. When they want to rest
- 4. When they feel the need to be alone
- 5. When they want to give or receive love: Hugs
- 6. When they want to read silently
- 7. When they want to meditate and breathe deeply
- 8. When they need to solve a conflict with a friend
