#### FY24-25Draft Budget - Key Take Aways

- Inclusion of 4% COLA and 6% Healthcare cost projection increases
- Draw down \$1.980 M from Fund Balance (Reserves\*) to support current operations for Strategic Plan Implementation






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### **Shared Operating Budget**






## **Admin Budget**

- Virtual group for Latina/o/e/x families
- Tu y Yo aims to promote early learning in children ages birth through age five
- Facilitated by Help Me Grow Care Coordinator and a Star Vista Bilingual Mental Health Clinician
- Partnerships with Sonrisas, WIC and Project Read
- Families learn about child development through guided activities and discussions led by a Mental Health Clinician on positive discipline, attachment, routines and more

First time parents shared their experience:

- Papá dijo, "Qué bonita experiencia estoy aprendiendo como jugar con el niño."

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

# Children Now 2024 California Children's Report Card

California ranked 51<sup>st</sup> (out of 50 states & D.C.) for parents reporting it was not possible to obtain mental health care for their child. Denials by health plans are a major barrier to kids getting mental health care.<sup>74</sup>

Nearly half of parents reported that it was somewhat/very difficult or not possible to obtain care.<sup>75</sup> California parent-reported difficulty obtaining mental health care for their child

### Early Childhood Mental Health by the Numbers

- Estimates from Zero to Three, Think Babies and the CDC indicate that 10-16% of young children experience mental health conditions, including PTSD and anxiety
- This number increases to 22% for families living in poverty
- Since the COVID-19 Pandemic, early childhood educators have noticed significant changes in children's behavior including increased anxiety and irritability, and challenges with conflict resolution and problem solving. (First 5 SMC Workforce Survey, 2022)
- Left untreated, mental health conditions lead to greater expenses for individual families and the community as children grow.



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## Mental Health and Children with Special Needs

- Mental health conditions are more common among CSHCN. According to 2022 data from the National Survey of Children's Health, 51% of California CSHCN ages 3 to 17 had one or more diagnosed mental health conditions—compared with just over 5% of their peers without special health care needs.
- CSHCN are more likely to have multiple adverse childhood experiences than their peers. The share of CSHCN in California who have experienced four or more adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) is more than five times that of children without special health care needs.









#### **Cash Gift Component**

#### \$300 per month to birthing parent for 36 months

- Money delivered through debit card or gift card (method TBD)
- First 5 will contract with a financial partner to manage cash disbursement

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#### **Coordinated Care Component**

#### A Community Health Worker from HPSM will:

- Check if families are connected to a medical home and home visiting program, and connect/reconnect them with these services as needed
- Ask about other family resources they need at birth
- Conduct periodic check-ins over 3 years to see if they are still accessing medical home and home visiting program, and connect them to additional services they are interested in

#### **Population Focus**

- Eligible population: Residents of San Mateo County with Medi-Cal funded births
- HPSM Medi-Cal births in 2022: 1,169
- Top cities of residence: San Mateo, Redwood City, Daly City, East Palo Alto
- Top delivery hospitals: Lucile Packard Children's Hospital (70%), CPMC (10%), Mills Peninsula (10%)
- 45% Hispanic, 7% Asian, 5% white (39% other or no data)



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#### **Evaluation**

- Randomized Controlled Trial
- Led by multiple departments at Stanford University, including the Center for Population Health Sciences, the Department of Pediatrics and School of Medicine, the Center on Early Childhood, the Center on Poverty and Inequality, and the Health Policy Department
- Codesigned with First 5, HPSM, County Health, Human Services Agency
- Applied for NIH funding in March

### **Study Design**

Baby Bonus = \$300/month for 36 months

 Coordinated Services = Connection to home visiting, medical home, family resources

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
### **Key Outcome Measures**

Still to be determined, but likely to include:

- Health care utilization
- Service access and utilization (e.g. WIC, home visiting, childcare)
- Parental workforce participation
- Parental mental health
- Child developmental status
- Parent-child relationship qualities
- Household income
